
It's that time of the year when you are decorating and un-decorating for the holidays. How many items do you keep in your holiday bin that you don't even use anymore?

Village Effect-Living in Community

As a church we offer many opportunities to gather as a community. Every time you attend worship, coffee hour, a committee meeting, a church wide event, or participate in a mission outreach event you are participating in the "communal" life of the church. Don't you catch yourself sharing snippets from your daily life with your pew mates, fellow committee members or fellow volunteers at an event? Our Next Chapter in Our Life Together

As we turn the page from thirty years of ministry and leadership by our newly honored Pastor Emeritus, Tom Thomas, to our next chapter in our faith journey as a people of God, we will implement our Interim Plan.

The Interim Plan which was proposed by Church & Ministry upon consultation with our Conference Minister and adopted by Consistory, begins immediately. Most congregations take at least a year to prepare for and call a pastor. Since we are a relatively large church with multiple programs and staff, it could take even longer.

Among the many tasks we must complete before searching for our next Senior Pastor are: (1) Develop a plan for Ministry and Mission (long range plan) which will include surveying members, focus groups, meetings with staff, committees, lay leaders etc.,(2) Do some visioning on where we want to go in the next 3-5 years as a congregation, the types of ministry we want to pursue, missions we want to embark on, worship styles we want to keep or change,(3) complete our congregational profile which we will use to begin our search.

Since we have not completed a comprehensive plan or prepared a congregational profile in over thirty years, we have much work to do in the upcoming months. Pastoral candidates will expect we have done our part to prepare for our next called senior pastor by thoroughly examining our vision of who we are and what characteristics we desire in our next leader.



We have called Rev. William Metzger to work with us as a Consulting Interim Pastor who will lead us through a process that will help us discern God's call and planning for our future ministry and mission. "Pastor Bill" will begin working with our leaders to develop a Leadership Planning Team who

will begin work in January and will be with us for the next 12 -18 months in order for us to complete the tasks. It is impossible to determine exactly how long this process will take (will depend on our pace of work, time available from our lay and clergy leadership, challenges, other unforeseen factors) but it often takes between 12-18 months.

While this work is occurring, we will, of course continue to provide the ministries and worship experiences we all need and have come to rely on. The Interim Plan calls for our newly created Interim Team to leads us during this time of transition.

Pastor Kris will serve as Acting Lead Pastor. A full description of her new duties will be disseminated later but will include staffing the committees previously staffed



by the Senior Pastor, serving as chief of staff (administration), increased duties with worship/ preaching, weddings, funerals etc.



Pastor Patience's hours have been increased to allow her to continue with our visitation list, Golden Times and Adult Sunday Morning class but she will add hospital visitations and funerals to her portfolio.

We have called Rev. Dr. Allan

Kramer-Moyer to join us for 25 hours per week as our Interim Assisting Pastor who will provide worship leadership/preaching, hospital visits, weddings, funerals, and will assist with Bible study classes. "Pastor Allan" joined us on November 4th. We welcome him to our church family and eagerly look forward to his ministry among us.

The Interim Plan also calls for lay leadership to assume enhanced roles with our High School Choir (Chris Hamm), Youth Group (Dave DiPaolantonio) and Confirmation Class (Dan Topp, Sue Ondrey and Karen Nuschke).

I am confident that we have a great interim plan in place and a seasoned staff including three clergy who are "real pros" who will provide us with their diverse gifts honed by their many years of pastoral leadership and lay leaders who have been ministering among us many years as well. Mission Committee


The Mission Committee has announced that the advent offering will be divided among three worthy programs. The Neighbors in Need program of the United Church of Christ will receive \$300. The remainder will be divided between the Sixth Street Shelter and the Daybreak Program of the Lehigh County Conference of Churches.

Neighbors in Need (NIN) is a special mission offering of the UCC that supports ministries of justice and compassion throughout the United States. One-third of NIN funds support the Council for American Indian Ministry. Two-thirds of the offering is used by the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries to support a variety of justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects through grants. For more examples of the great programs funded by Neighbors in Need, visit www.ucc.org/nin

The Sixth Street Shelter in Allentown, the largest family shelter in the region, has been providing housing and casework services to homeless families with children since 1984. It is a program of the Community Action Committee of the Lehigh Valley. The shelter has 25 units and provides intensive programming for up to 60 days. During their stay, family members work with the Shelter's caseworkers to design a goal plan, which includes a search for permanent housing, life skills education, and a budget plan.

The **Daybreak** program of Lehigh County Conference of Churches began in 1979 as a response to the release of large numbers of state mental hospital patients into the community without the necessary supports. Daybreak's purpose is to prevent homelessness by offering selfsufficiency programs for men and women who have successfully completed or who are currently being treated for mental illness, drug and alcohol abuse, or HIV/AIDS. In a recent year, more than 250 individuals – 80 percent of them homeless or at risk of being homeless – were assisted.

The project is collecting cold-weather accessories for local families living at the Sixth Street Shelter in Allentown. Donations of new hats, scarves, gloves, mittens, and socks in men's, women's, and children's sizes are needed for the colder winter months ahead.

Since 1984, the Shelter has been providing temporary housing for Lehigh Valley homeless families with children. Today, the Sixth Street Shelter proudly offers 19 individual family apartments. It is the only shelter in the Valley to offer homeless families the privacy and security of a furnished apartment with a complete kitchen. The philosophy of the Sixth Street Shelter, in keeping with the broader mission of the CACLV, encourages those it serves to accept responsibility for themselves.



Flu season is here! If you haven't already received your

influenza vaccine, now is the time. The Center for Dis-

- Each year's vaccine is different and protects against different strains- strains that are predicted to be the most common.
- Effectiveness of flu vaccination generally lasts through the end of flu season.
- This year's formulation of vaccines includes a trivalent (3-strain) injection, a quadrivalent (4-strain) injection, a high-dose trivalent (3-strain) injection (for ages 65+), and a nasal spray. All are effective in protecting against the flu.
- You can NOT get the flu from getting a vaccine, but vaccination can result in a sore arm, low fever, or mild achiness.
- Up to 156 million flu vaccine doses are being manufactured for US distribution- NO shortage is expected.

Flu vaccines are available at doctors' offices, walk-in clinics, urgent care centers, and a number of local and chain pharmacies. Legislation was recently passed in Pennsylvania allowing registered and specially trained pharmacists to provide immunizations- most pharmacies don't require appointments for vaccines, so it could save you a trip to the doctor and/or an office visit fee. Often times, the vaccine costs are covered as preventative care through insurance. Don't delay- get your shot today!
