After nine months of construction, our new baby in the grove has arrived. The food stand was completed by May 1, 2018, then preliminary grading of the ground began May 2nd, then the driveway area was prepped on May 3rd. Finish grading of the ground was done on May 8, with the grass seed hydro sprayed on the whole area on May 9. Watering began soon after, now we wait and watch the grass grow !!! Two layers of pavement will occur soon to finish the driveway area.

A big Thank You to Simock Construction of Neffs for their hard work these past months on building the food stand, and overseeing the various subcontractors who performed many varied tasks. Rick Simock and his son Jason Simock were on the job daily as the construction schedule dictated.

From preparing the foundation, to pouring concrete, to framing and constructing the building, to finishing the inside walls and ceiling, to building the counter tops, to creating and finishing the sidewalks, Rick and Jay performed many varied tasks throughout the construction process, under my watchful eye. I am grateful for their dedication to following through with the many com-



plicated details of the project, and their skills and craftsmanship to provide the church with this beautiful new food stand.

A second Thank You goes to Brian Selig and Selig Electric for their work in all of the wiring and electrical needs of the food stand and the grove. From working with PPL to install a new transformer and underground service, to disconnecting the wiring from the picnic pavilion and then reconnecting, to wiring all of the lights and outlets in the new building, to disconnecting the grove lighting strings and installing two new light poles and reconnecting the grove lights, the electrical needs of the project was huge, and performed to the highest of standards.

There are many others to be thanked, which will be done at the dedication of the food stand during the outdoor worship service on Sunday June 24, 2018. We will celebrate with Build Your Own Sundae Sunday, hot dogs, ice cream, and refreshments, see you there.

Family Promise Update Pastor Kris and the Mission Committee

Family Promise enables communities to work together to address the needs of homeless families by securing temporary shelter through host congregations, providing meals donated by host congregations, and comprehensive services offered through local governmental and privately funded aid groups.

- Steering Committee helping to organize the various pieces needed.
- Donating, Preparing Serving Supper, Breakfast, Bagged lunches

Celebration of Life By Jeffrey Mensendiek, Missionary

Teruko's funeral was like no other. She called it a "Celebration of Life" Her dream was to build a "blended community." She wanted to bring people together from all walks of life, and to witness the birthing of something new. She had choreographed her own farewell party. She wanted us to wear bright dazzling colors, instead of the customary black mourning clothes. The rainbow was to be the symbol of our blended-ness. So there we were, all six-hundred of us, crammed into the limited space at the Aoi Church in Kyoto. We were there, not only to celebrate her life, but to celebrate life itself. At one point during the service we joined in a responsive reading called "The Confession of Life." Death will not have the last word. Darkness cannot overcome the brightness of the love that we share. Pain, suffering and loss will not forever cloud the vision of hope that binds us. Together we declared our belief in LIFE, and the enduring power of God's love for all living things.

Teruko was a visionary. Twenty years ago she got together with a few friends (including my sister Martha who is also a CGMB mission co-worker) to start the Bazaar Café, in Kyoto. The Bazaar Café is located on the first floor of an old missionary house owned by Common Global Ministries. It has been a ministry to the marginalized; HIV/AIDS patients, people with a history of drug/alcohol abuse, sexual minorities, and others who are ostracized and downtrodden in society. Migrant women find work cooking in the kitchen three days a week preparing ethnic food for lunch at the café. Young college students work as volunteers to support outreach activities, and various events on weekends have brought people together to learn and share. This ministry has been supported by our church partners in Japan.

Ten years ago Teruko contracted Sjogren's Syndrome, which is an autoimmune disease. This meant that her body slowly deteriorated to the point that she had to spend her final years in a wheelchair. She had to always depend on having oxygen pumped into her lungs. Her physical weakness was increasingly noticeable, and yet her vitality and love for others grew stronger by the day. She gave of herself. She listened and cared. She was able to minister to others through her own struggle and vulnerability. She often spoke of "the wounded healer;" a term that had all the more impact coming from her. Through the Bazaar Café she had been able to bring the wounded and vulnerable together, and to embrace the joy and meaning of life even in the midst of suffering and pain.

At her "Celebration of Life." I had worn black in the traditional Japanese way. Pinned to my chest was a rainbow emblem. I looked out over the sanctuary in amazement, wondering how Teruko had managed to touch such a diverse group of people in such a genuine way. Some were in very dazzling colors. One looked like he had just come from the carnival in Rio de Janeiro. After the service, three friends came forward to share their memories of Teruko. One was a woman now working as manager of the Bazaar Café. Her speech was not polished. Her words were straight to the point. "When I came to Kyoto and met you, I, for the first time, started to believe that life was worth living. I was so happy the day when I was finally able to thank my mother for bringing me into this world. You were the one who enabled me to do that."

The night before, it had rained hard prior to Teruko's wake. Ten minutes before the wake was to begin, the rained cleared. One person called out; "Look, a rainbow!" It was certainly not lost on the crowd assembled that this was an added blessing and promise of God's love for all people.

As we have gotten older, we have also enjoyed helping lead Sunday School and Breakfast Club classes, as well as volunteer at VBS. By far, however, the contribution we all four enjoy the most is the opportunity to participate in special music offerings here at Union UCC.

Outside of church (between the four of us) we are actively involved in instrumental and choral music programs, theater, dance, soccer, wrestling, ultimate Frisbee and various clubs and organizations within the Parkland community. While these activities are enriching, they frequently conflict with our family's church worship opportunities, but we do our best to have at least some family representation in church as often as possible.

Each of us agrees that our church is a safe haven where we can gather together as a family. We love how there are countless opportunities for involvement regardless of your age. Tales from the Road

Our own Regan Haley is a great advocate for God's wonderful gift of creation. Regan is in fifth grade at Kratzer Elementary School in Parkland. She treated our Adult Education class to a very inspiring lesson on ways to care for the environment, complete with a YouTube video and craft. Regan herself was inspired to make some changes in her life and in the life of her family when PPL brought an "Eco friendly" presentation to her classroom at school. Regan learned how to reduce water and electricity usage in her home and can inspire you to do that too! Regan's family now uses a reduced water flow shower head and a five minute timer in the shower. Regan reminds and encourages her brothers, Tegan and Kaden, to turn off lights and keep their showers short. The family uses ecofriendly products such as Mrs. Meyers line of hand soaps, dish soaps and plans to add Mrs. Myers laundry detergent on their next shopping trip. (You can find Mrs. Myers products at Target, along with a number of other ecofriendly cleaning products.) Regan's family even uses biodegradable dog poop bags for their four footed family members, Rosie and Henry. (They recommend the brand Eco-Clean, which is available on Amazon.) Be sure to unplug all electronics that you are not using, such as toasters, coffeepots, phone, tablet and computer chargers and electric pencil sharpeners.

Regan is on the Green Team at her local elementary school, and ensures that other students put the plastics in their appropriate recycling receptacles when they clean up their lunch trays. One of Regan's ideas is to have a local sculptor (who happens to work as the custodian at the school) design a more creative recycling container to help motivate the kids to recycle more.

Regan inspired us with a great video that demonstrated many ways of repurposing everyday objects. If you're curious try this link, <u>https://youtu.be/3ETqGos67wQ</u>. What a lot of fun ways to find new and creative uses for everyday objects.

We had lots of fun filling egg shells with potting soil and planting sunflower, cucumber, petunia and carrot seeds. I can't wait to pop them right in my garden once they sprout.

Our class ended with a brainstorming session about ways we could recycle more items. Did you know you can recycle batteries and many electronics at AERC Recycling Solutions, 2330 Southwest 26th Street, Allentown, PA 18103 from 9 a.m. -3p.m. the second Friday of every month? Look up their list of acceptable items and prices at <u>www.aerc.com</u> or call 866-447-5177.

Feed My Starving Children by Eliot Lightner

Last October my son Everett and I took part in a Feed My Starving Children mobile meal packing event. My hope was to show him the importance of giving back as well as to help him appreciate how lucky we are for all that we have. I had no idea of the impact the event would have on me.

Before the meal packing began, we were told that on average 6,200 children die each day from hunger related causes. That is one every 14 seconds. Each one of these deaths is preventable because there is plenty of food it is just not where it is needed most. FMSC is a Christian nonprofit organization working to feed the children most in need. Every meal is packed, paid for, and distributed by volunteers. After hearing this, we were all ready to get started.

Packing a meal involves placing scoops of rice, soy, vitamins and minerals, and dried vegetables into a funnel. A bag at the base of the funnel collects the ingredients and then is heat sealed. This scientifically developed formula helps to treat and prevent malnutrition. There were several of these work stations trying to pack as many meals as possible. Before I knew it we were told time was up. After a brief cleanup we came together to hear the results. We packed over 67,000 meals! That is enough to feed 184 children for a year.

After the event I could not stop thinking about it. Never have I felt like I was part of something that made such an impact in the lives of those in need. I wanted to bring my experience to others so I started to tell people about my experience and my desire to bring an event to the Lehigh Valley. Everyone was very supportive so I contacted FMSC to see if it would be possible. It makes me so proud to say that on **the weekend of October 12th of this year we at Union UCC will be hosting the first ever FMSC mobile pack event in the Lehigh Valley**. Please consider getting involved. Together we will turn hunger into hope for children in need.
